

According to the Pew Research Center, in 2014 fewer than half of the minor children in the United States lived in a two-parent home. Until the publication of *Life and the Single Parent*, there was no substantive commercial publication that addressed the particular needs of those homes. This excellent, new publication is published in Southern Florida, but beyond some community content, its focus is absolutely national in nature. Its content strives to address all family members, with columns such as “Teens Talk,” “Community,” “Healthy Living,” and “Parent Corner.” It has coloring pages and puzzles for the youngest, and interviews with teens. Some recent article titles include “Teach Your Children Well, Helping Kids Honor the Other Parent” and “Single Parenting With Chronic Illness.” Its content is thoughtful, generous, and very positive. Any public library that addresses the needs of families should be purchasing this title.

Parent & Child has an interesting life: first, it is a printed magazine that covers learning issues from birth to about six years, happening to be part of Scholastic's larger web presence, which includes not only this magazine's content. But also, it takes the reader further through middle school. Not surprisingly, Scholastic has collected an advisory board for the magazine that includes several national early-childhood experts. The articles are short and informative, and are intended to bridge a child's preschool learning experience with his or her learning life at home. The magazine presents learning and health issues, behavioral and developmental information, and lots of activities for parents to use at home. All public libraries should consider this magazine; also, learning resource centers at schools that train early-childhood staff should purchase it.

Parents has in many ways become the industry standard for parenting magazines. As with many others, its focus tends to be on early-childhood development and health topics rather than on issues associated with older children. There are many regular columns on child development and health, and on maternal and parental health—which are often focused on readers' questions. Feature articles include many short pieces on family life, home style, fun time, and health and safety, to name just a few departments. Highly recommended for any public library that addresses the needs of families.

Oh, my. Double the joy—and double the trials of parenthood! Although there probably isn't a parent of twins (or triplets) who would have it any other way, there's no question that there are particular issues, both logistical and psychological, of handling the children of multiple birth. With fertility technologies increasing in use and sophistication, twinning (and beyond!) is much more common than it once was, so a cheerful, helpful magazine like *Twins* is welcome. It contains product reviews, feature articles, developmental discussions, and more. Articles are thoughtful, often highly personal discussions of issues and successes. Some recent titles include “The Best of Both Worlds, How Parents of Multiples Run Successful Home-Based Businesses” and “Double Talk, Do Your Twins Speak a Secret Language.” Recommended for public libraries.

Introduction

The field of peace and conflict studies grew out of the devastating violence of the First World War and gained traction in academia in the decades following World War II. In 1918, President Woodrow Wilson outlined Fourteen Points for peacemaking, which laid out many of the same principles for peace, such as disarmament and free trade, which are still recognized by peace scholars today. With the creation of the United Nations following the end of the Second World War, it became apparent to scholars that in order for the United Nations to succeed in its mission of promoting peace and international cooperation, rigorous research needed to be conducted in the areas of conflict resolution and peace.

In 1948, the first undergraduate academic program in peace studies in the United States was created at Indiana's Manchester University. With the Vietnam War and the growing desire of anti-war college students to pursue peaceful solutions to violent conflicts, similar programs and related courses became more widespread throughout the 1960s. The number of peace studies courses available at universities worldwide increased dramatically by the 1980s, because a nuclear apocalypse seemed imminent. Peace and conflict studies remained widespread throughout university curricula after the Cold War, but the focus shifted from the Cold War emphasis on international conflict to a more comprehensive focus on peace and conflict as it relates to the human condition with a growing interest related to human rights, gender inequality, human security, democratization, as well as the more traditional aspects related to security issues and conflicts.

As peace and conflict studies grew in academia, peace-related research institutes were simultaneously founded. The Peace Research Institute Oslo (PRIO) was the first such organization to be created in 1959 and with it came the creation of the first peace and conflict-focused journal: the *Journal of Peace Research*. Additional peace research centers were created, such as the Peace Science Society (which publishes the journals *Journal of Conflict Resolution* and *Conflict Management and Peace Science*), the International Peace Research Association, and the Peace and Justice Studies Association (which publishes the journal *Peace and Change: A Journal of Peace Research*).

Peace and conflict studies is both interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary, encompassing and integrating a variety of disciplines including international relations, political science, history, philosophy, gender studies, religious studies, economics, geography, anthropology, and psychology. Additionally, it is multicultural—examining conflict and relationships at all levels, from interpersonal to international. Both theoretical and empirical methods are used by researchers in this field to analyze conflicts and propose peaceful resolutions, while also examining issues related to human rights, marginalization, and ecological degradation, with the goal of promoting sustainable world peace.

This topic is of interest to scholars and laypeople alike and as such, there is a wide variety of literature available for all levels of expertise. From grassroots organization newsletters to peer-reviewed scholarly articles written by leading experts in the field, there is no shortage of resources for peace and conflict studies and the publications highlighted in this section represent the top resources on this spectrum. These resources provide the latest insights and research in the multifaceted, multidisciplinary area of peace and conflict studies for researchers, activists, scholars, and policy makers.

The Arms Control Association, which publishes this magazine, was founded in 1971 and is a national nonpartisan membership organization dedicated to promoting public understanding and support for arms control policies. It helps provide policy makers, the press, and the public with authoritative information, analysis, and commentary on arms control proposals, treaties, negotiations, agreements, and other national security-related issues. This magazine, published ten times a year, is dedicated to promoting a better understanding of arms control subjects and offers comprehensive data and intelligence on national-security issues. Each issue begins with a "Focus" editorial essay that highlights an important issue related to arms control. The "Features" section provides three to four articles per issue written in a jargon-free manner by both scholars and non-scholars alike on a variety of topics related to international arms control and disarmament. Additionally, interviews with important decision makers in the arms control arena are also conducted and well documented in the Q&A section. Issues alternate between a "Book Reviews" section or a "Looking Back" section; the latter is generally essays analyzing the current implications of past events. The "News and Analysis" section provides brief articles on current events related to arms control. This is an excellent resource for academic libraries and research centers.

Founded by a former Manhattan Project physicist, the *Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists* aims to increase the public's interest in atomic energy and its risks. Since 1945, the *Bulletin* has stuck to its mission of educating citizens about the dangers of nuclear weapons, and in 1947, this publication created the Doomsday Clock, which has become the universal symbol of the various threats to humanity, including weapons of mass destruction, climate change, and disruptive technologies. Featured articles cover such topics as climate change and rising sea levels, nuclear proliferation, and cybersecurity. The "Nuclear Notebook" column has been published since 1987 and provides an overview of a different country's nuclear capabilities. Issues often have a theme that shapes the content, such as artificial intelligence, the future of food in a time of climate change, or nuclear testing. The *Bulletin* provides refereed articles about nuclear weapons, global security issues, and threats to humanity that are written in an accessible manner for the general public, policy makers, scientists, scholars, and journalists.

Fellowship is the oldest continuously published multi-faith, multi-cultural peace journal in the United States. Published quarterly by the Fellowship of Reconciliation (FOR) organization since 1935, it follows its predecessor, *The World Tomorrow*, which began in 1918. *Fellowship* publishes analytical insights, spiritual visions, and personal journeys to aid people of all faiths to commit themselves to a nonviolent world of justice, peace, and freedom. A recent issue features articles such as "Israel's heroic conscientious objectors deserve our support" and "Confronting Gun Culture." In addition to articles on both current and historical events, *Fellowship* also provides interviews, poems, and news briefs to round out its thoughtful approach to encourage conflict resolution through peaceful efforts by all individuals. This publication would be useful in both public and academic libraries.

Founded in 1994, *International Peacekeeping* was the first scholarly journal to focus on examining peacekeeping activities following the end of the Cold War. With an expansive scope, this journal provides analysis and debates regarding peacebuilding and monitoring activities, humanitarian intervention, preventative deployments, sanctions, international policing, and the complex relationships between peacekeepers, civilians, NGOs, rival factions, and state authorities. This scholarly, interdisciplinary journal focuses primarily on international conflict, while also exploring intergroup conflict and conflict between nations, to help advance the comprehension of issues related to war and peace. Peace Magazine is published by the Canadian Disarmament Information Service, a group committed to educating the public on all aspects of peace. Published quarterly, this magazine consists of articles, news stories, interviews, reviews of films and books, and letters. Their online site also includes an hour-long weekly talk show called "Project Save the World." Recent articles include "Surprising Partners and Enemies in the South Caucasus" and "Opposition to the Extreme Right in Germany." This magazine is only available electronically. This is a good magazine for high school libraries, as well as public and academic libraries.

Introduction

Most of the magazines in this section commonly feature articles on health, wellness, nutrition, care, welfare, behavior, communication, grooming, training, advocacy and rescue, and the human-animal bond, as well as heartwarming stories of actual animals.

Most pet magazines, such as *Modern Cat*, *Modern Dog*, *Reptiles*, and *Tropical Fish Hobbyist*, focus exclusively on either cats, dogs, reptiles, or fish.

During the past several years, there has been an increase in the number of titles that publish articles on natural care, nutrition, and holistic medicine. For instance, the focus of *Animal Wellness Magazine* is on natural health care. Other publications provide medical information for pet owners. The Cornell University College of Veterinary Medicine publishes *CarWatch* and *DogWatch*, which are newsletters that contain medical, health, and behavioral information on cats and dogs.

For the past ten years, there has been a steady decrease in the number of printed popular pet magazine titles. Fewer and fewer pet magazines are available for purchase in Barnes and Noble and Books-A-Million stores, and I have observed that very few pet magazines can be found in the current periodicals area of public libraries.

When I first began authoring this section more than 20 years ago, most Barnes and Noble and Books-A-Million stores had an average of five to ten pet magazines on their shelves. Now, I am fortunate if I can locate two or more titles in these stores. Each time I have updated this section, I have visited numerous Barnes and Noble and Books-A-Million locations to see what magazine titles are being sold and have been tracking this information for years.

In the past, I have been able to obtain sample issues of pet magazine titles from publishers. However, some of the publishers, who previously had sent me issues, are now ignoring my requests for sample copies so I have no way of reviewing these titles. Due to the lack of response from these publishers, the
